2010 INCOSE Symposium Proposal

A team led by the Midwest Gateway chapter is proposing to host the 2010 INCOSE Symposium at Pheasant Run Resort in St. Charles, IL, about 45 minutes west of O'Hare International Airport. Team members for the proposal are from the Heartland and Crossroads of America Chapters. MGC participants, as of this writing, are Bill Schoening (General Chair), Bill Jennings (Technical Program), Cihan Dagli (Academic Forum), Ron Howard (Publications), Bob Scheurer (Marketing & Publicity) and Steve Recker (Webmaster). We are seeking chairs for Finance, Sponsors, Plenary Sessions and others that will be filled later.

Why 2010? We proposed for 2009, but the INCOSE Events Committee chose Singapore. Also, it is our turn in the US Midwest to host a symposium. Also, 2010 is the 20th anniversary of INCOSE, so we have an opportunity and a responsibility to put on a good show.

Why St. Charles, Illinois? The committee began life looking at a regional conference and then grew into the symposium. With the help of PCMI, the conference management firm for INCOSE, we asked numerous cities to propose potential venues including both meeting and hotel sleeping rooms. Among those examined were St. Louis, Chicago, Minneapolis,

Dallas, New Orleans, Cincinnati, Indianapolis, and Dayton. INCOSE needs meeting space relative to the number of hotel sleeping rooms we fill, and that limits the available venues from our perspective. In addition, some hotels (e.g., Adams Mark in St. Louis where IS 1995 was held) would have too many unused sleeping rooms and too few meeting rooms to attract other customers. Some venues are very expensive, some lack adequate meeting space, and some had too few sleeping rooms directly

adjacent to the meeting rooms, and some were not very appealing (cold and dark.) Pheasant Run in St. Charles Illinois and Cincinnati stood out as the best options. I made a site visit to both.

Pheasant Run is a resort setting, and we will be the only occupants. There is plenty of meeting space, and 600 sleeping rooms between the resort proper and a hotel owned by Pheasant Run directly across the road. That is more slightly more sleeping rooms that INCOSE has used in the immediately adjacent hotels in the past.

What comes next? Our proposal was submitted on 17 December, and will be reviewed by the Events

Committee at the Workshop in Albuquerque, NM in late January. We should hear by mid February. We do not know what other proposals might be submitted, but we suspect that the Wright Brothers chapter in Dayton will submit one. Once selected, we will begin recruiting co-chairs and chair positions that have not been filled. A few long lead items will be addressed, such as a contract with Pheasant Run as well as identifying and contacting major speakers. Most of the other planning and execution will take place beginning in the spring of 2009.

What is in it for members supporting the Symposium?

First and foremost, this is an opportunity to do something for the organization to which we all belong. In addition, it will encourage us to develop relationships with other INCOSE members, many of whom we have never met. No one will be paid; this is a voluntary organization. However, we hope to provide all those who provide support with a complimentary registration for their own use. We will have to establish some minimum level of involvement, but it is not expected to be very stringent.

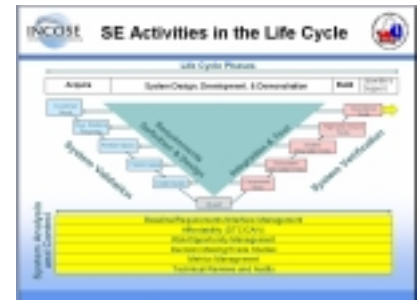


Force Majeure
